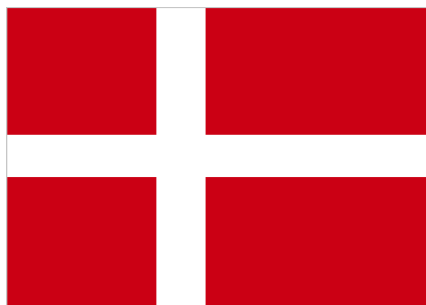




Study Abroad in Denmark



Higher Education in Denmark

- There are four types of Danish educational institutions, Universities, University Colleges, Artistic Higher Education Institutions and Schools of Maritime Education and Training.
- Many courses are taught in English and students can opt for either a full bachelors or a shorter exchange programme.

Entry Requirements & Application Process

- Student with non-Danish qualifications need to research the entry requirements carefully.
- For undergraduate studies, the admission deadline is 15th March 12 noon for courses starting in August or September. A few institutions have additional intakes in January or February. For those courses, the deadline is 1 September. The application forms are available from the institutions approximately two months prior to the deadline. Online application forms can also be found at www.optagelse.dk the centralised application system
- Be aware that each institution applied to must have received a signature page before the admission deadline in March. Up to 8 institutions can be applied to and these must be ranked in order of preference.

Fees

Higher education in Denmark is free for students from the EU/EEA and Switzerland. For those outside this area, which includes students from the UK, the fees are Euro 6,000-16,000 (DKK 45,000-120,000) depending on university and degree being studied. Please be aware that living costs in Denmark are high.

Visa

EU and Swiss students do not require a visa to study in Denmark but non Nordic students must register with the local immigration service.

Non EU students do require visas and they should check out the requirements with the Danish embassy.

Working

Nordic, EU/EEA or Swiss citizens can work in Denmark under the EU rules regarding the free movement of people and services, with no restriction on the number of hours.

Non-EU/EEA/Swiss citizens may work in Denmark for up to 20 hours a week and full-time during June, July and August. However, this requires a work permit sticker in your passport.
