Only slight rise in deferral applications this year



While many of this year's applicants thought about deferring the start of their studies to next year only a few have followed through on this. Based on data last week, 31,380 applicants now have at least one deferred choice, compared to 30,760 at the same point in 2019. While this is a 2% increase, this is set against an overall rise in applicants this year of 1.2% by the January applications deadline. The most notable shift has come from students who have decided to 'un-defer' by cancelling any gap year plans to start their studies this autumn instead. Most Universities will offer face to face teaching this autumn



97% of British universities are planning to offer at least some in-person teaching and face-to-face social opportunities this autumn, according to research by <u>Universities UK (UUK) poll of 92 universities</u>. More than four in five (87%) are also planning to provide in-person sporting, fitness and wellbeing activities in the autumn. Alistair Jarvis, chief executive of UUK, said: "Although their first term will be different from previous years, most students can expect significant in-person teaching and a wide range of social activities and support services. "Universities are committed to providing an engaging academic and social experience for all while ensuring the safety and welfare of the whole university community."

Large number of UK Universities fall in world rankings for a 4th year



A total of 62 out of 84 UK institutions saw their world ranking fall for the fourth consecutive year, according to the 2021 university guide compiled by Quacquarelli Symonds (QS). Oxford University slipped from fourth to fifth place, while UCL fell to number 10 – two places down from its 2020 standing. Ben Sowler, director of research at QS, attributed the falls to poorer teaching and declining research. Top academics and students from Europe and around the world may no longer see Britain as the attractive to place to study it once was as a result of Brexit. EU Students no longer eligible for home fee status from 2021



On 23 June 2020, Universities Minister, Michelle Donelan, announced that from August 2021 EU students will **no longer be eligible for home fee status** for courses starting in academic year 2021/22. The change will also apply to further education funding for those aged 19+ and funding for apprenticeships. EU students entering HE in 2020/21 will be unaffected and will pay home fees for the duration of their course. It is expected that UK students applying to study in the EU in the academic year 2021/2022 will be required to pay international student fees. Post qualification university applications under review again



Gavin Williamson, the Education Secretary, is planning an overhaul of England's university admissions system with students applying after A-level results and the start of the academic year possibly being moved to January. This is the latest in a long line of attempts going back to 2006. Under the proposed changes, school leavers and other applicants would proceed with university applications after receiving exam results, having gained a clear understanding of the courses for which they qualify. The long gap following the end of exams would allow universities to run courses to prepare students for higher education, as well as opportunities for applicants to attend open days and consider their options. Apprenticeships starts down by nearly 50%



Apprenticeship starts have dropped by almost half since lockdown compared to the same period last year, according to new Department for Education figures. Provisional data published last week shows that from March 23 to May 31 there were 26,090 starts compared to the 50,050 reported between those months in 2019 – a fall of 47.9 per cent. Many of these were for the lower level 2 apprenticeships. The DFE stressed that final data will not become available until later in the year, so therefore at this point it is "unclear what the true number of starts in the affected period was or if the level of underreporting at this point in the year has been affected by the lockdown". BAE Systems and Unilever bucking the trend with apprentice recruitment



BAE Systems is continuing with plans to bring on board 800 apprentices over the next 12 months, in recognition of how crucial they are to the delivery of its projects now and in the future. Unilever also confirm that 80 apprentices will be joining their organisation in September. Both organisations have relied on virtual technology for onboarding their recruits. Update on T-Levels



The first three T-levels to be taught this September will be in construction, digital production, design and development, and education and childcare, with a further seven including three in health and science taught from 2021. Eight T-levels in subjects including legal, accounting, management and administration and engineering, manufacturing, processing and control will be taught from 2022. The remaining seven T-levels, including courses in agriculture, environment and animal care, catering, creative and media, and hair and beauty, will be rolled out from 2023, bringing the total to 25.
