Higher Education in The Czech Republic

- The higher education system in the Czech Republic is divided into public, state and private institutions.
- In total there are 26 public higher education institutions, 2 state higher education institutions and 34 private higher education institutions.

Entry Requirements & Application Process

- International students applying with UK A-levels, the IB or other non-Czech qualifications should check each university's international student admissions requirements. You may be required, depending on whether you are applying, before you receive your examination results, to take admissions tests. If English isn't your first language, you'll probably be required to take TOEFL tests.
- To study full time, apply directly to the university of your choice. You may apply for several study programmes at various institutions and faculties.
- The deadline for submitting applications is usually the end of February or March. Most higher education institutions offer the option of filing an application in electronic form. The date, content and form (oral or written examination, aptitude test) of the admission procedures are decided upon by the dean of the faculty or the rector of the higher education institution.

Fees

A university degree in the Czech language at public universities is free of charge for citizens of all nationalities. However, study programmes taught in English and/or at private institutions are subject to tuition fees. The exact amount depends on the respective institution and study programme. Check university websites for more detailed information.

Visa

Depending on your nationality and status, you might have to apply for a visa or residence permit to enter the Czech Republic. You should start your visa application as soon as you receive the official letter of admission, as the procedure can take up to 60 days if you are from non-EU countries.

Working

This depends on which country you come from, if you have an EU passport you can work while you are studying.
