



Teaching



OVERVIEW

The compulsory UK education system is broadly divided into primary and secondary schools, with a few authorities running a three-tier system. Afterwards students move on to 6th Form, FE or apprenticeship / work with training. The key stages include:

Early years foundation stage (EYFS): 0–5-year-olds - nursery and reception

Key Stage 1: 5–7-year-olds - school years 1-2

Key Stage 2: 7–11-year-olds - school years 3-6

Key Stage 3: 11–14-year-olds - school years 7-9

Key Stage 4: 14–16-year-olds - school years 10-11

SKILLS

To become a good teacher, you need:

- The ability to relate to pupils and their parents/carers.
- Enthusiasm for the subjects you teach & knowledge of the age range and curriculum.
- The ability to deliver information in an engaging and understandable way.
- Organisational skills.
- Dedication, commitment and resilience.
- The ability to deal with conflict.

Routes to qualification and professional accreditation

Primary and Secondary School Teachers need to have a degree qualification. Secondary School teachers need to be qualified to teach their degree subject or a closely related alternative. Some degrees courses have Qualified Teacher Status (QTS) incorporated in the degree programme. With QTS you also get additional training and support in your first 2 years as a teacher, now known as the ECT (previously the NQT), helping you to grow in confidence and develop the skills you need to succeed. Having QTS is a requirement in state schools. Teachers in the FE sector train via the Level 5 Diploma in Teaching.

Entry Requirements to degree courses and degree apprenticeships

Many Secondary teachers will study a subject degree first followed by via the Post Graduate Certificate in Education (PGCE) to qualify as a teacher, whereas Nursery and Primary teachers can qualify via a 3-year degree in Early Years or Primary Education with QTS or take the degree subject followed by PGCE route. Nowadays, there are also some 3-year degrees in Secondary Education with QTS available.

For Primary Teaching you need:

5 GCSEs at grade 4-9, including English Language, Maths and Science, plus degree, etc.

For Secondary teaching you need:

5 GCSEs at grade 4-9, including English Language and Maths (unless you will be teaching a Science/Sciences of course), plus degree/PGCE, etc.

If you do not have a degree, you can do undergraduate teacher training via a degree alongside qualified teacher status (QTS). Or you may be eligible to do a [teacher degree apprenticeship \(TDA\)](#).

Work Experience

You can visit schools or FE colleges to get unpaid experience in the classroom before you start your initial teacher training (ITT) or Level 5 Diploma in Teaching. It can help you:

- decide if you want to train to be a teacher
- discover if you'd like to teach in a primary or secondary school or in an FE college
- build a relationship with a school or college you might want to work for later

During your experience, you'll get to do things like:

- observe lessons
- see how teachers manage a classroom
- find out how specific subjects are taught
- speak to teachers and meet pupils
- learn more about teacher training - including the application and interview process

What can it lead to?

Entry is generally competitive, but less so for shortage subjects such as Maths, Physics and Modern Foreign Languages.
