

Post 16 Options

Full-time study programmes (typically 3-5 days a week)



Consider the differences between further education providers, their courses and the support offer in place. Location is also important.

Visiting as many places as possible can help inform decision-making.

Think about the level you are working at, and what is the achievable next level. Further education destinations are completely personalised according to the individual.

If there is a job you would like to do in the future, research what options are best linked to that career and which further education providers offer suitable courses.

Apprenticeships



You would be employed to do a job and also study towards a related qualification. You may be working 4 days a week and go to college 1 day a week.

Apprenticeships are competitive and not all applicants will be offered a place. It is useful to have a backup plan such as applying for full-time study programmes (such as through a college).

Understand the process; training providers/colleges will support the process, but you may be required to find your own employer.

Work experience can support your apprenticeship applications. You may also be required to submit a CV when applying for an apprenticeship.

Employment with accredited training



Another option is to go into paid employment, self-employment or volunteering for a minimum of 20 hours each week. If you are under 18, this must also include accredited training. The training aspect must equate to 280 hours and be a nationally recognized qualification.

Traineeships & supported internships



Traineeships and supported internships are designed for people who may be looking for a job (such as an apprenticeship) or who feel that they do not yet have the skills, qualifications and/or experience to start either an apprenticeship or employment with training.

They are short work experience programmes (typically lasting between 6 weeks and 1 year). They are for 16-24 year olds, and young people with an EHCP (Education Health Care Plan) up to age 25.

Traineeships and supported internships are unpaid but may lead to an apprenticeship, further training and qualifications or other full-time work.
